What is an interesting fact about you that your students might be surprised to know?

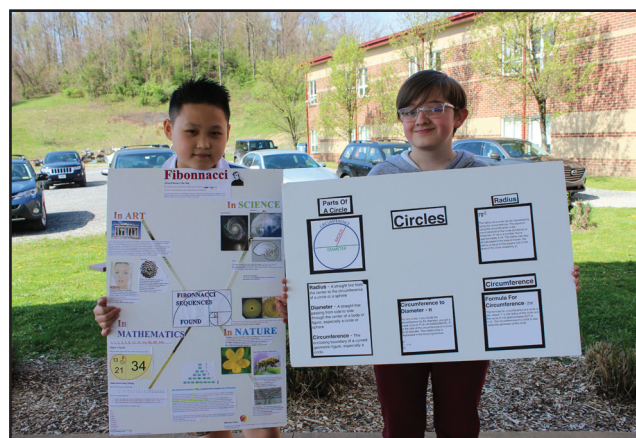

Math Strong and STEM Ready

STEM education is more than a buzz-word at Trinity. Various committees and administrative teams, including the math/science department, are continually evaluating the current curriculum and programs. Their collaborative efforts have led to a number of initiatives in the areas of STEM. Math Strong and i-Ready were two programs that were introduced mid-way through the school year.

"Math Strong was a six week incentive to promote math across all core disciplines in order to show the importance of math," said Guidance Counselor Teresa Barnett. "It was also the kick-off to our i-Ready program which has the goal of increasing each student's math skills according to their individual abilities."

"It was a fun time for students to use math in all of their subjects," elaborated secondary math teacher Carrie Breakey. "We ended the program with a celebration for Pi day."

Through individualized and self-paced online instruction, i-Ready challenges students in grades 6 and 7 to expand their math skills.

"Math is integral to all the other STEM disciplines, so we want to make sure that our kids have a strong foundation specifically in math," said secondary math teacher Nicole Arias.



The school announced that the math and science curriculum will be updated for the 2017-18 school year. The unprecedented decision, to invest this heavily in math and science in a single year, will greatly impact students' learning.

The new curriculum will feature hands-on conceptual learning for grades kindergarten through 8.
