

2018-2019 AP European History (AP EURO)—Mrs. Ridgway's Summer Assignments

Welcome to Advanced Placement European History, otherwise known as AP EURO. There is a lot of reading and writing in this class and it is imperative that you begin this process early. Complete the list of summer work and have it ready to submit on the 1st day of school. Keep in mind that this class requires extensive reading and covers a wide range of European History. By the end of the school year, you will have accomplished two introductory college Western Civilization/European history classes. Our pace is about a chapter a week. This means that it is rigorous and requires that you set aside time to work on it each day.

You will be receiving a syllabus on the first day of school and will need to read through the syllabus, sign it yourself, and have your parent/guardian sign it. By signing it, you are confirming that you have read and understand the commitment required in an advanced placement class, you agree to check google classroom on a regular basis, and you will utilize the class website regularly. Be sure to visit the website on the syllabus once class starts.

In the first paragraph, begin with a quote from the book that you thought was interesting and discuss it. Then, critique the book or film and rate it using a scale of 1 to 5 stars (***** = Enjoyed it greatly to a * = didn’t enjoy it all). In the remaining paragraphs, choose three specific facts (or people) that you felt were important to understanding the story and analyze them, react to them and discuss them.

How to make Index cards for Online Document Assignment (ODA)

(FRONT OF CARD)	NAME:
Speaker: Who is the Speaker ? (Name and description of character)	
Occasion: What is the Occasion ? The time and the place of the piece; the context that prompted the writing.	
Audience: Who is the Audience ? The group of readers to whom this piece is directed.	
Purpose: What is the Purpose ? The reason behind the text. Is it to persuade, entertain, attack, condemn, support, etc.? What did the author want his/her audience to think as they read his/her writing?	
Subject: What is the Subject ? State the subject in a few words or phrases. 3 bullet points reflecting the author's main idea.	
Tone: What is the Tone ? Describe the attitude of the author. Find words and phrases that describe tone of the whole piece.

Question Responses: Answer the main question of the ODA Assignment. Use complete sentences.	
Quote: Copy a sentence or statement from the text that you think is powerful and/or a reflection of the overall theme from the reading.
