Starting Strong in Preschool

The importance of a good start can never be emphasized enough. Recognizing this, the preschool team at Trinity is devoted to seeing early learners have a great beginning to their school experience.

"At Trinity Christian Preschool we believe that all children are a gift from God and that the years of early childhood provide a unique opportunity to encourage, inspire and establish strong educational practices and lay the foundation for an education for life," said Pre-K3 Teacher Kendra Sainato (pictured above).

To provide the best environment, the preschool classrooms are equipped with interactive stations, well-designed learning spaces, and purposeful play areas to encourage each student's healthy growth and development.

Mrs. Sainato added, "We nurture child development in all aspects of growth with hands-on learning while celebrating the children's individual gifts and encouraging each one to reach his or her highest potential."

Staying true to the school's mission and vision to equip students with a Christ-centered worldview, the teachers aim to provide early childhood learning experiences based on Biblical principles. The curriculum is designed to supplement and foster learning in the home, and to help each child make a smooth transition between home and elementary school.

Q – What is your favorite Bible verse?



Getting Technical

For the first time, high school students can choose to take Engineering, Technical, and Computer Science as an elective.

Adjunct instructor Marcus Fisher, Chief Engineer for NASA and Assistant Professor for the Information Systems Management program at Fairmont State University, is using his experience to introduce students to various technology topics. According to Fisher, the goal is for students to leave the class with the knowledge to build web applications, understand basic electronics and circuits, as well as program and understand basic robotics.

The first quarter was devoted to programming; the students built and deployed a basic web application using HTML, Cascading Style Sheets (CSS) and JavaScript. In the second quarter, the students assembled a navigable robot using basic circuits and arduino microcontrollers, as well as learned how to command and control the vehicle through wireless communications.

The high school elective builds upon the success of the middle school coding elective introduced in the 2018-19 school year. In May, two middle school coding students, Daniel Han and Adelyn Tager, won the West Virginia's Middle School Cyber-Robotics Coding Competition.

Adelyn said she really liked learning the new languages of code last year. When asked about the competition, she said, "That was our first year doing it. I definitely didn't expect to win." The middle school students plan to compete again this spring.
